Birmingham's proposed new \$2,714,300 high school on Birmingham's proposed new \$2,114,300 high school on the Cranbrook-Lincoln avenue site would be constructed around a simple, well-developed, but modern, educational need, rather than requiring a high school curriculum to fit a pre-designed school building.

Plans for the proposed new high school are not something which have resulted only recently. For more than five years the Birmingham board of education has recognized this future need and has been repearing for it. The
