

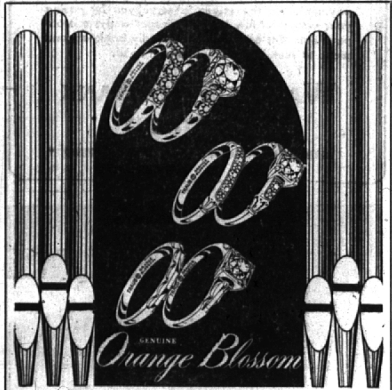

This annual affair has come to be a feature event for a great many families in the community who find it an inexpensive method of replenishing the family library, and securing some of the best current reading at greatly reduced prices. All types of books are of course represented with fiction and non-fiction, reference books, religious, textbooks, a large collection of children's books and in fact, general worth while reading material.

Proceeds from the sale are used to finance scholarships for deserving and talented students and to assist the national scholastic program of the AAUW which includes national and international scholarship awards. Recent such aid was extended to a very gifted Norwegian girl, Martha Tyse, who studied chemistry of agriculture at Michigan State College. After completing her course in East Lansing she returned to her native city, Bergen, Norway, to assist in the rehabilitation of her war-ravaged homeland.

Miss Martha Gruber of Birmingham became acquainted with Miss Tyse at MSC and visited her in Norway while on a recent trip to Europe. Miss Gruber reports that Miss Tyse is doing research work for one of the largest fishery companies in Norway and her work is helping to rid the fishing banks of a dangerous parasite which has threatened to decrease the supply of fish, the single staple in the Norwegian diet.

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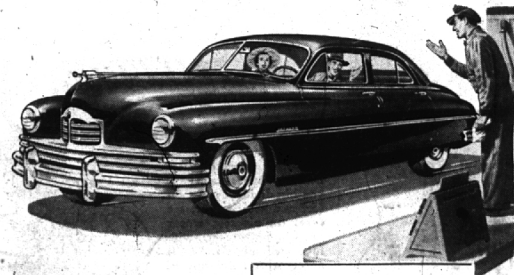
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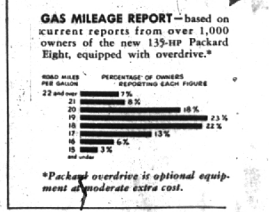
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
