This is a civic project carried on entirely for the pleasure and educational benefit of children. Whatever funds are left over after operating expenses are donated to the cause of children for health and education. Free tickets are supplied wherever there is need. The Children's Theatre Group makes every effort that no child be excluded for want of financial resources.

In the past, each play has received an overwhelming response and has been attended by a "full-house" capacity. Since ninety per cent of the children attend all four shows, it has been found that the season ticket plan is more economical in time, effort and money, both for the Children's Theatre Group and for the teachers. Therefore, all children's tickets are offered as season tickets.

William Merrill, director-producer of the Willow Way Theatre is addressing the Children's Theatre group last month said that, "In presenting plays combining dancing, singing and good story plot, the children are given the opportunity of coming into contact with a larger picture of life.
