Ruth Shain Class Reconvenes Nov. 1

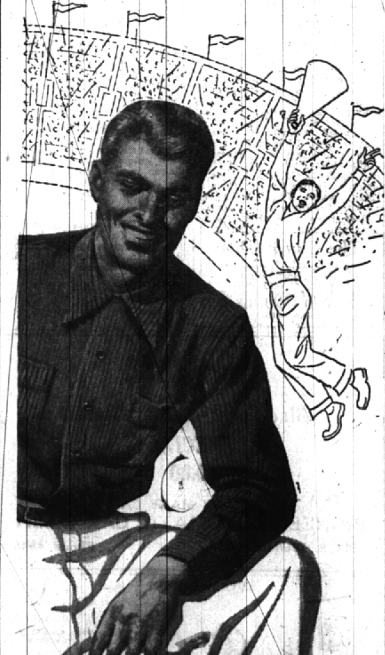
