Unusual Veal Kidney Chops Can Add Considerable New Interest to Meals

For a larger veal chop serving, homemakers might well choose kidney chops. Veal kidney chops are cut from the rib end of the veal loin and contain a cross section of the kidney which makes them easy to distinguish in the meat dealer's display.

As veal is young it has a light fat coating so it is best when cooked with moisture. Braising is the ideal method of cooking these chops. This is also true of veal steaks and the other veal chops—the rib chops, the shoulder cut arm and blade chops as well as the loin chops which correspond to beef porterhouse and T-bone steaks.

In preparing chops or steaks, dredging them first in flour will aid in their browning. After coating, the chops are placed in a frying-pan in a little hot lard and browned on each side, then seasoned. A little liquid is added and the frying-pan tightly covered. Slow cooking until the chops are tender brings out their fine flavor.

Veal chops can be braised with sauce, fruits and vegetables for tasty combinations. For variety, instead of using water as the cooking liquid, tomato juice, sour cream, fruit juices or milk can be used. Braised veal chops spiced with grated cheese and a couple of tablespoons of corn meal can be added to the seasoned flour coating them before browning.
