LEND AN EAR

AN INVITATION TO MUSICAL LEARNING
 Birmingham is very fortunate in having the series of lectures on music appreciation that are being conducted by the Birmingham Musicale and the Community House during the months of October and November—a group that is setting a standard that might well be followed by other communities, big and small.

Such stimulation of musical interest in many more communities would make the larger and more receptive audiences for fine music, thus accelerating the musical growth of America and expanding its cultural horizon.

These lectures which include such subjects as "The Composer at Work," "Trends in Contemporary Music," "Songs and Singers," and "Cathedrals of Music," represent years of study on the part of the speakers, all of whom are authorities in their particular field.

Many Interesting Aspects
 They will offer musical information which has been weighed and sifted and which is now presented to you on a silver platter. These discussions will provide a listener with many interesting aspects of music that should give him a better understanding of some of the factors that have influenced the creation and development of music.

But perhaps the most interesting relationship to other arts, to politics, to economics, and to religion—musical function in our lives and works—knowledge which makes human beings out of mere animals, is the emotional appeal to all of us on the emotional level. Melody, rhythm and harmony all combining to exalt and charm us, have often sent us forth from the concert hall gaily humming the strains of Tachikowsky or Beethoven, in a mellow mood of musical retrospect which lasts all too short a time.

But the intellectual approach enhances the emotional reception, for it serves as a factual skeleton upon which it is easy to hang musical phantasies.

One derives a fuller enjoyment of music by a study of the composer, his life, his moods, his background, and his works. In Bach the religious motive predominates. In Beethoven, whose themes are noble and majestic, we see his tempestuous outbursts of rage followed by fits of remorse echoed in his music in terms of great tonal contrasts of serenity and fury.

In Brahms, we note the conscious restraint he exercised in his personal emotions portrayed in his music in a depth of feeling that is a development of individuality. In Sibelius there is reflected the brooding of a people, both northern and oriental.

Primitive Influence
 In Tachikowsky—despair and suffering—a deep interest in his life, are also pronounced in his great music. In Moussorszky, one sees the influence of the stark primitive force of the Slavic Soul.

In Debussy, the veiled and subtle poetry of a musical Marlaine. In the dissonances and atonalities of the moderns, Stravinsky, Prokofiev, Schoenberg, and Shostakovich, we see reflected the tempo of our times, with the accent on the abstract and mechanistic.

I think it can be safely stated, then, that music as an art is doubly effective when appreciated on more than one level. The emotional level takes precedence over the intellectual, but together they are the key to the greater enjoyment of music.
