The Barons defense was superb. In the beginning of the game Bill Moore went back in punt formation but the center was over his head, and Fraser recovered on the ten. It was first down and goal to go for Fraser, but the Barons dug in and held them to only five yards in four plays.

Late in the second quarter the Barons picked up 60 yards in three plays, to the Fraser 29 yard line. One of these plays was a yard run by Hairback Clarence Pomeroy. The attack bogged down on the 23 yard line and the Barons lost the ball.

A Different Game  
It was a different ball game in the second half. The score is deceiving as the Barons rarely lost control of the game. Ends Bill Moore and Bruce Wilson intercepted three passes to keep the Fraser attack down to nothing.

In the third period BHHS took the ball on its own 47 and drove 53 yards to a touchdown. Thirty of those yards were picked up by Fulback Charles Lane, who really played a beautiful game. Twenty more yards were accounted for by Woods Proctor, quarterback, who threw to Bill Moore over the goal line for the touchdown. Lane went over for the extra point.

The Barons will take on Big Beaver at that school next Wednesday at 4:30.
