### Father and Son Injured In Crash

Sanford Ries, 25, and his two-year-old son, Russell William, were injured late Tuesday afternoon at the corner of Chapin and Cummins. Both suffered severe head injuries. Hospital attendants said yesterday morning that their conditions had improved during the night and that the baby's condition was no longer considered critical.

Lawrence A. Westerly, 47, Ries' father-in-law and the third passenger in the car, suffered minor injuries.

Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said the accident happened when Robert John, 15, struck the rear of the Ries car as it cleared the intersection, traveling north on Cummins. Moxley said the youth reentered his speed at about 40 miles an hour as he drove into what is considered one of the most dangerous crossings in the city.

After making a statement to the police, John was released to his mother pending the outcome of the Ries baby's injuries.

### YMCA Membership Campaign Closes; Goal Is Assured

It became evident last Friday evening that Birmingham YMCA's membership campaign would be a success and that its goals would be reached. At a meeting of the 12 branches of the Detroit YMCA, Harold Kalbfleisch reported a total enrollment in the 1949 membership campaign of 502 members and \$1,385 in cash. This compares favorably to the branch goal of 450 members and \$1,500 in cash.

With final reports due this evening, co-chairmen Kalbfleisch and Oscar Peterson are very hopeful that the cash goal not only will be reached but passed.

Birmingham finished in third place among the Detroit branches in the number of members obtained and the actual cash turned in, trailing Dearborn and Royal Oak. With the current campaign at a close, the total enrollment of all members served by the Birmingham branch is 902.
