Big Beaver Whips Bloomfield Barons

The Barons of Bloomfield Hills high school lost to Big Beaver last week 14-6. The two teams were just about evenly matched in the game, except for one play which was repeated five times by Big Beaver, and clicked successfully four times. This was the difference between winning and losing for the Barons.

Except for that play, the Barons played beautiful football. Big Beaver didn't make more than 75 yards rushing against the Bloomfield line. Big Beaver was clicking more than half of their passes attempted.

The play that beat the Barons was a pass play. It clicked for two touchdowns of 45 and 35 yard spans, and two gains of 20 yards each.

The first touchdown for Big Beaver came in the first period. Quarterback Oaks passed to Moeche, right halfback, from the 45 to the 40 yard line on the right flank. There wasn't a defender anywhere near him and he ran all the way.

This same play, wherein the defenders are drawn over to the left worked again for Big Beaver in the second quarter. Oaks again passed to Moeche on the right flank on the Bloomfield 35 yard marker, and he ran all the way. Untroubled, Robertson, a kicking specialist converted both times.

The Barons scored spectacularly in the last 10 seconds of play. With three minutes to go, the Hills squad found themselves on their own 10 yard line. The Barons moved like great guns collecting four successive first downs.
