

## Plans Completed for Woman Voter Finance Drive

Last week Mrs. J. W. Richardson, finance chairman for the League of Women Voters, announced final plans for the League's Finance Drive.

To support public services such as tax remission to property owners, voters' service bulletins at time of elections and continual research and publication on government problems, it is necessary to supplement annual League membership dues with funds donated by interested citizens.

As Mrs. Richardson put it, "Research for and publication of local, state and national government material takes money, and League membership dues cannot cover the cost of those activities, because we are holding dues at a minimum to keep the League every woman's organization."

"They Represent You," a compact directory researched and published by the League here in Birmingham, is being re-issued this week to answer questions voters repeatedly ask.

These community services to people in Birmingham are planned at all times to be factual and non-partisan; to inform on local, state and national affairs of primary importance. During October the League focus is on the school expansion program here.

Mrs. Graham Shinnick, League president, pointed out that three-fourths of the League's budget is spent here in Oakland County, the remainder for support of the state and national organizations. Mrs. Shinnick added that inasmuch as the group is working solely in the public interest, citizens of this community are urged to help finance these efforts by contributing to this year's drive.
