They are considered the best possible means of getting all the facts before local residents, in addition to telling the details of the plan and why it is needed, questions are welcomed from those who attend the meetings.

How will the school expansion item be worded on the ballot? Who can vote in this election? When are the registration deadlines? What percentage does it take to carry the vote? Have we paid for the schools we already have? How much is it going to cost each taxpayer? Is there any chance that the new high school will not be large enough to serve our increasing school population? If built, when would it be ready for use?

These are some of the questions asked the education committee of the Birmingham League of Women Voters, headed by Mrs. William Jackson, at a meeting held at the home of Mrs. Charles Blunt Wednesday afternoon to make preparations for the free discussion sessions on the school expansion program sponsored by the League this week.

Two-Hour Sessions
 "If you have questions of any kind," explained Mrs. Blunt, "or you want to express any shade of opinion on the school issue, come to any one of these three sessions. No reservations are necessary and all citizens, whether men or women, whether members of the League or not, are welcome."

The two-hour cracker barrel sessions on the expansion will be held Monday morning at 9:30 at Baldwin Library; 1:00 p.m. Monday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Ogden Post, 515 Puritan, and Wednesday night at 8:00 at the home of Mrs. Blair Swartz, 2512 Dorchester.

The cracker-barrel discussions on the school expansion program will be the try-out of the Birmingham League's new unit plan, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Blunt, which will feature informal discussions throughout the year on issues within the League's sphere of activity. These monthly sessions will be in addition to the more formal afternoon programs sponsored by the League the third Monday of each month at the Community House.
