

Y Membership Drive Behind 1948 Figure

Although 335 renewed and new members were reported at the initial report meeting of the Birmingham YMCA membership drive Monday evening in the YMCA offices, co-chairman Harold Kalbfleisch and Oscar Peterson stated that the drive lags behind the record made a year ago.

The seven teams engaged in signing up 450 members and raising \$1,500 in cash reported but 23 adult memberships. This is almost 60 behind the 1948 pace. Letters urging interested citizens of Birmingham to back a boy or girl have been dispatched. It is hoped that many of those who have memberships expiring in October renew by mail and continue their support in behalf of the youth of this community.

Tells of Experiences In a talk to the canvassers, Kalbfleisch told of his many experiences as a boy in the 'Y' program and the excellent training he received as a camper at the state 'Y' camp, Hayo-Want-Ha.

Peterson urged all workers to make their contacts early in order that the goal can be reached before the campaign enters its final stages.

The next report meeting is scheduled for Monday evening in the 'Y' office at 8 p.m. The total to date are: 235 members and \$459 in cash.

Dr. Clarence W. Cranford, pastor of the Calvary Baptist church, Washington, D. C., will be the guest speaker. Dr. Verne S. Mumbulo, pastor of Nardin Park Methodist Church, will be the local speaker. A group of 25 local business, industrial and profes-

sional men will join the motorcycle leaving Detroit to attend.

Oscar L. Bard, president of the Detroit YMCA board of directors will preside. Oscar E. Fife, soloist of the Plymouth Congregational church, will sing. The Rev. J. H. Smith from the host church will administer communion to the more than 300 expected to attend this retreat.

Splendid Record

Dr. Cranford, before going to Calvary Baptist Church in Washington, was director of youth work at the Baptist Temple, Philadelphia and held pastorates at the Logan Baptist Church, Philadelphia and the Second Baptist Church of Richmond, Va. He is credited with the largest Sunday school class held in any church in the District of Columbia. Two morning services are required to accommodate a membership of 3,500.

Dr. Mumbulo succeeded Dr. Marshall R. Reed who became Bishop of the Michigan area in 1948. He formerly served churches in Wyoming and Ohio. He has been an active member of

the Northeast Ohio Conference and is a former vice-president of the Cleveland Church Federation.
