**Appointed Christ Church Organist**

Maurice Garabrant will assume the position of choirmaster and organist at Christ Church Cranbrook beginning Sunday, Oct. 30, according to an announcement made by the Rector, The Rev. Robert L. DeWitt.

Mr. Garabrant has been organist and master of choirs at the Cathedral of the Incarnation, Garden City, L. I. since 1928. During his stay at the Cathedral he served as head of the department of music and as organist at Adelphi College and as director of music at St. Paul's school. While serving in these capacities he also found time to serve the community by becoming a founder and director of the Long Island Choral Society, the Long Island Bach Festival and the Long Island Diocesan Choral Institute. He is a member of the executive committee of the Hymn Society of America, the American Guild of Organists, the St. Wilfred Club of New York and a Fellow of Trinity College, London.

Presented Recitals  
Mr. Garabrant studied under William C. Carl, Linwood Farm and Dr. T. Tertius Noble. He received his academic training at the University of California at Los Angeles, Columbia University and Union Theological Seminary from which he received the degree of Master of Sacred Music. Advanced studies in composition were undertaken under Frederick Schlieder and Arnold Schonberg.

Before coming to the Cathedral of the Incarnation Mr. Garabrant had served as summer organist at Harvard University and as assistant to Dr. C. Tertius Noble at St. Thomas' Church in New York City. During this time he was also engaged in extensive recital tours in both the United States and Europe, and also was chosen to present the first series of organ recitals to be broadcast over the radio, which were sponsored by the National Broadcasting Com-
