Fall Will Arrive
Sept. 23, U. of M. Astronomer Says

ANN ARBOR—Fall will begin on Friday, September 23, at 4:06 a. m., Eastern Standard Time, when the sun enters the autumnal equinox.

This will be the feature attraction of an astronomical nature during September, according to Dr. Hazel M. Loeb, assistant professor of astronomy at the University of Michigan.

If you want to check your directions note where the sun rises and sets on September 23, Dr. Loeb advises, since it will be at exact east and west on that date. The day and night will be of equal length and the sun will start its long journey south of the equator. Days will be increasingly shorter and the nights longer until the sun reaches its most southern point, the winter solstice, in December.

Jupiter Will Dominate
The bright planet, Jupiter, will continue to dominate the night sky during September, according to Dr. Loeb. Jupiter will be in the south while Venus will start its bright "evening star" in the west. Take a look in the west at twilight on the evening of Sept. 23, and the crescent moon will be very close to Venus.

The perigee around September 25 should prove favorable for the observation of "earthshine," a faint pinkish glow on the moon caused by the reflection of sunlight from the earth. The glow lasts up to the lunar landscape at a time when it is turned away from the direct rays of the sun. Dr. Loeb says a more fanciful title for this astronomical event is "The Old Moon in the New Moon's Arms."
