Home Beautifying Courses Bring Fame to Mrs. Spittler, Lecturer and Author

When the class comes to order, Mrs. Ethel Greig Spittler of East Lincoln road does not look across a desk into a sea of youthful faces. She glances down from a speaker's platform at a group of women, eager to hear her message finish his education takes even more from the family purse. They are not able to buy top-quality furnishings for their homes. They do not want their rooms to look shabby when guests come in. The answer: Do it themselves.

There is a general national trend toward the return to a closer home life. This is true among all ages. People are not going out as often as in the past few years. Home is beginning to mean more in the scheme of American life. Young women, especially, are proud to be able to say they, alone, are responsible for the room, when friends admire it.

A beautiful room, created by the young wife, gives her not only a feeling of comfort and ease, but one of deep satisfaction for it is her own work. It makes her home mean more to her, creates an atmosphere for a happier family life.

Two Books

Mr. and Mrs. Noble Spittler present their work on a radio test about three years ago. Mrs. Spittler conducts the classes, while her husband acts as contact man and agent for the "firm." Her two books, "Let Us Make Slip Covers" and "Let Us Make Curtains and Draperies" are in their third printing. Revisions have been made to take on the new style which has found its way through the various classes.

She says that back in Iowa, her native state, some of her friends declare she was born with a needle in her hand. She cannot recall the time when she began to love sewing. Her lessons began with her grandmother and mother—hemstitching flour sacks. Her father added his contribution by infusing in his little daughter the fact that if a thing is worth doing at all, it is worth doing well.

It was not until after her marriage that Mrs. Spittler tackled her first slip cover, and then at her husband's insistence. Mrs. Spittler soon found herself taking lessons in New York and Chicago. The next step was easy—professional home decorating in her native Iowa. Later, after the couple moved to Michigan, she was invited to teach an adult class at a Y. W. C. A., and then at thousands of homes in this area have received benefits.

The national scope was the next natural step. Their tour has carried them into Kansas, Nebraska, Utah, California, Ohio, Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Tennessee, Texas and of course, Michigan.

"In nearly every case," Spittler said, "we have been asked to re-

turn at a future date before we have finished the first engagement. It gives you a pretty good feeling. We're not selling a thing. We are simply presenting an opportunity for the women to learn how to beautify their homes."

"Yes," Mrs. Spittler added, "it's simply a way to answer every woman's desire for beauty in her home and put it in a price range she can afford."

"She need not buy expensive fabrics. In fact, I always suggest some cheap material for her first attempt. Another thing I try to encourage, is a slip cover and drapery wardrobe. By using these inexpensive materials she can have several changes of covers with matching or contrasting drapes and curtains. Her home can always be kept fresh and clean looking at such a small expense."

Foreign Interest

A longing for beauty is not confined to American homes, either. We have sent a number of our books to Manila, Canada and Hawaii, and just recently were thrilled when a request came from Nigeria in West Africa.

in order that they may make their homes more beautiful.

Mrs. Spittler travels the country giving lectures and lessons on making slip covers, draperies, curtains and rugs. Through her teachings thousands of women have learned to beautify their homes and a much smaller expense and with the added thrill of watching the improvement grow under their own hands and through their own efforts.

"During the war," Mrs. Spittler said, "it was a great morale builder for women. It gave them something to do during long hours of loneliness; it made it possible for them to improve their surroundings on limited incomes; it was something to write their husbands about; it was something to plan and anticipate as a surprise for him when he returned home."

"Since the war, many young couples are starting married life under difficult circumstances. The limited income is still with them, and often a husband trying to Monday evening in Alton House at 8:30 Holy Hour First Thursday evening of the month at 8:15 a.m."
