"Uncle Jim" Nessler Will Visit Local Schools Next Week

Known affectionately to his radio audiences as "Uncle Jim," James P. Nessler, of Toledo, Ohio, will appear before audiences in the Birmingham public schools next Tuesday, Sept. 20, under the sponsorship of the Birmingham Y.M.C.A., as it launches its fall membership campaign and program. Through constant practice and study, Nessler is able to imitate the calls of many birds native to this locality.

For 17 years he has been a close student of nature and has photographed birds, Kingman's wildflowers, insects and reptiles with kodachrome color film establishing a file of over 1,000 slides. His schedule, as arranged by the Y.M.C.A., brings him to Quanton school at 9:15 a.m.; to Adams in 10:30 a.m.; to Barnum at 11:10 a.m.; and to Poppleton in Troy Township at 2:30 p.m.—Because of the lack of space at Pierce school, Nessler will have to forego his appearance there until next year.

As part of the program, the Birmingham Y.M.C.A. will distribute its club schedule for the year and Edwin F. Kirbert, executive secretary, will tell the audience of the "Y" plans for 1949-50.

Eaton Mfg. Co. Pays Tribute to Workers Killed in World War

Marshall Fredericks, local sculptor, attended the ceremonies in Cleveland Friday when the Eaton Manufacturing company dedicated seven monuments, honoring seven employees killed in World War II. Gov. Frank A. Lausche of Ohio, Judge Frank A. Piard of Detroit and Clarence I. Ochs, president of the company, took part in the dedication which was broadcast to some 7,200 employees in 12 Eaton plants.

Monuments, designed by Fredericks, have been placed in the plants at Cleveland and Massillon, Ohio, and Battle Creek, Detroit, Saginaw and Vassar, Mich.

To reduce the number of accidents caused by eye fatigue and labor turnover due to employee boredom, secret of manufacturers are using barrels of varietal-colored paints in the interior of their plants.

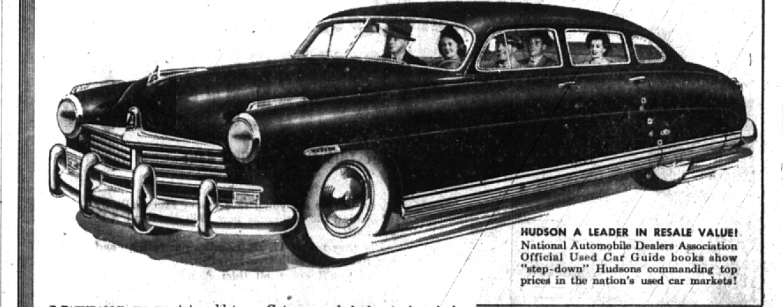
