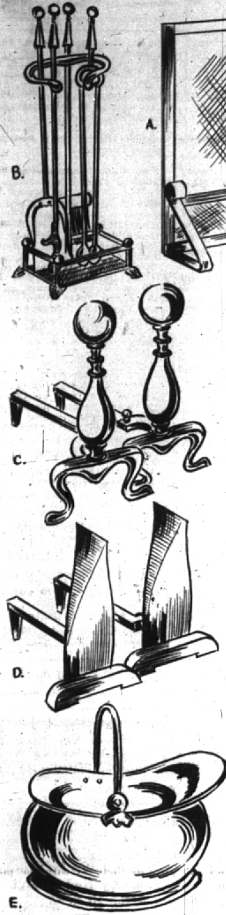
Seen at Meetings
