The SCORE PAD

(Signs and substance at the bridge table. Other settings.)

Miss Mary Mahlie, Michigan's leading woman bridge player according to some, was not happy. She gathered up her cards, inserted them in the slot on the board, and turned to her right hand opponent, F. J. McElhany, with a pained expression on her face.

"Mac, I loathe and despise your unspearable partner!"
"So? What happened, Mary? I wasn't following the play."
"What happened? Why the contemptible creature just perpetrated a phoney double squeeze! And my partner and I will take a nice big zero on this board, that's all." The situs of Mary's unhappiness:

The auction was all between Snaky and Mac, Snaky was the dealer and bid one spade; Mac, one no-trump; Snaky, three spades; Mac, four spades.
West opened the hearts four. This was ducked in dummy, Mary put up the nine, Snaky the ace. A low club was then led, West went right up with the king, dummy's six was played, and Mary signaled with the nine.
If West had led a diamond at this point this column would not have been written. But, fearing that "Snaky held the diamond queen," West led another low heart. Dummy's jack won on this trick. Mary played the king, and Snaky ruffed. Mary was now out of control in the heart suit. Snaky then ran six trumps, leaving this position:

Snaky led the club seven. West discarded the diamond five, dummy's queen was played. Dummy's heart five was led and Mary was in a quandry. She finally laid down the diamond nine to maintain useless protection in the club suit. Snaky ruffed and West followed suit with the heart eight.
Snaky then led the club ace and West was pinched. If he released the heart queen, dummy's ten was good; if he barred the diamond king, Snaky's jack would take the last trick. She spread her cards, hopefully. Score: six spades.

Gubernatorial Candidate

Thomas Stephen Leith, mayor of Brighton, extensive farm and commercial land-owner, builder, ex-college instructor and athletic director, yesterday announced his candidacy on the Republican ticket for election to the office of governor.
Mayor Leith's announcement was at a dinner of Livingston county supervisors of which the mayor is a member.
"In the interest of Republican success at the polls next year," said Mayor Leith, "I pledge myself to make a thorough, vigorous, and complete campaign, carrying it into each of Michigan's eighty-three counties."
"If I am chosen to the governorship," he said, "two of my major aims will be to take State government out of the red; and take the Reds out of the State government."
"There is a plank in my platform which provides: balance the State budget; pay State debts promptly; plug 'small leaker' stop deficit spending; create treasury surplus; complete essential units of the State's defaulted building program; take the general fund out of the grab-bag class."

To Clarify Zoning of Vacated Streets

When city streets are vacated, the new zoning should become the same as those parcels to which the street then becomes attached, the city commission decided Tuesday evening.
Since the city zoning ordinance does not indicate this procedure, the city attorney has been instructed to prepare an amendment to the code clearly setting forth this principle.
