

Cranbrook Display Shows Relationship of Art to Printing

The 28th Annual Exhibition of Editors' and Advertising Art opened at the Cranbrook academy of art on Saturday and will be on view through Sunday, April 23.

As in previous years, this exhibition is co-sponsored by the New York art directors club and the American Federation of Arts.

The exhibition consists of over 200 selected entries representing the best advertising submitted between February 15, 1948 and February 15, 1949. They fall into a number of categories including magazine advertising art, newspaper advertising art, trade periodicals, small ads, booklets, direct mail advertisements, art in periodicals and poster design.

Other exhibitions in the galleries at the same time will be a "Little Show of Work by Five Michigan Artists" as well as work in progress by weaving and ceramic students at the Cranbrook academy of art.

Museum hours are from two to five daily, except Monday.

A bit of the west will be brought to Birmingham April 18 by Colonel H. C. (Bud) Anderson, Union Pacific Railroad lecturer who has tramped most of the back trails of the plains and mountains between the Missouri River and the Pacific Ocean.

Col. Anderson will speak at a 7:30 p.m. meeting of the St. James Dinner club at the St. James Episcopal church, 355 W. Maple. He will be accompanied by a slide show of the west.

The appearance was announced today by C. J. Siegmans, traffic manager for the company at Detroit.

Col. Anderson recently succeeded Dr. R. A. Kirkpatrick, nationally known lecturer, author and educator, who retired in the age of 70 after 31 years with the Union Pacific.

UNTIL RECENTLY secretary-manager of the Wyoming commerce and industry commission, Col. Anderson handled the public relations, publicity, national advertising programs and the industrial development of the state's natural resources. Throughout his seven years in service and two years with the Wyoming commission, he has traveled and lectured in 47 states and 8 foreign countries.

Called to active duty in 1940 with the United States Army as a first lieutenant, he served in Europe and was released from active duty as a full colonel.

Boys in the production are all members of Cranbrook's 21-year-old dramatics club, called Engasterton from a combination of Greek words meaning "workshop."

Devoted within recent years to comedy, "The Barretts of Wimpole Street", marks a departure in policy by Engasterton.

Preceding the play, a group of younger Eng members will put on "The Turtle Dove", a Chinese drama done in the Chinese manner.

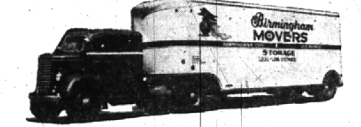
Easter services of the Townsite Community church were the first to be held in the new building, although it is not yet completed.
