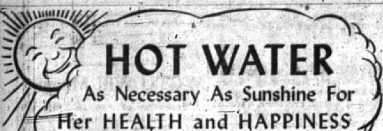


Mother's Club to Meet on April 18

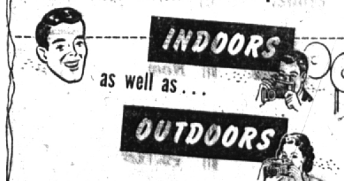
