MEAT CUT Quiz

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?
A. This is a beef arm pot-roast.

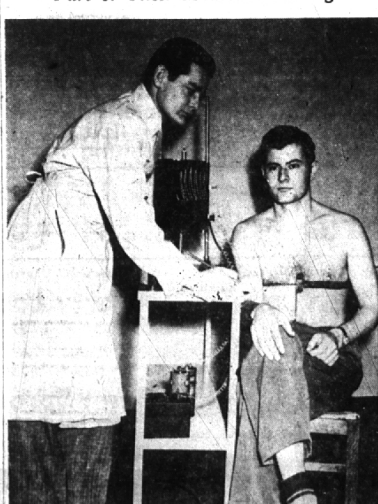
Q. Where does the cut come from, and how is it identified?

A. The arm pot-roast is cut from the chuck section of beef. It is identified by a small round arm bone which is located in the center of one end of the roast. The arm bone pot-roast also contains two or three rib ends. Another identifying mark is a small round muscle near the arm bone.

Q. How should this cut be prepared?

A. The arm pot-roast is cooked by braising in other words by the use of a small amount of moisture and low heat. When cooked by this method it is tender and flavorful, and comparable to the finest roast. Brown the pot-roast first in a small amount of fat in a heavy utensil such as a Dutch oven or a large frying-pan with a cover. When browned, add liquid—water, tomato juice or other vegetable liquid; cover tightly and cook over low heat until tender, usually about 3 to 4 hours. If desired, vegetables may be cooked with the pot-roast, adding them during the last few minutes of the cooking time just long enough for them to become tender by the time the meat is done!
