

High Aims Curb Delinquency, WL Parents Told

Walnut Lake—Stanley Burns, assistant principal of the Wayne county Detention home of Wayne county, spoke to the parents of Walnut Lake school students Monday evening. With a factual approach to the problem of delinquency, he cited reasons why the school, the parent and the citizen must concern himself with mounting prob-

lems of delinquency in urban areas. He said the suburban parent whose problem is markedly less can help all children by working for higher standards in movies, comics and television. Whether we like it or not, these are the teachers to whom our children listen. They can be forced for good as well as evil. Of 2,000 delinquent boys studied, 56 per cent named movies as their chief pastime, less than one per cent named hobbies," Burns remarked.

IN SPECIAL CLASSES in Detroit schools, about 90 per cent of maladjusted children can be adjusted by clearing up personality disturbances caused chiefly by family-child conflicts, broken

homes, rejection and neglect, he said. The speaker was introduced by Emory Randall, former Walnut Lake resident.

Detroit Physician Dies at His Home in Beverly Hills

Rosary services were held at the Bell funeral home Monday evening with a requiem mass Tuesday morning at Holy Name church for Dr. Patrick L. Ledwidge, 59, of 1227 Auburn drive, Beverly Hills.

Dr. Ledwidge died at his home Saturday morning after an illness of six months.

A specialist in internal medicine, he was a member of the Harper hospital staff in Detroit.

He was born May 18, 1890 in Pinckney and attended school in Howell. After being graduated from the Vesper Normal school, he took his medical degree in 1920 from the Detroit College of Medicine, now known as the Wayne Medical school.

Dr. Ledwidge has written several articles for medical publications and was a member and past president of the Michigan State Medical society. He had also been member of its house of delegates for five years.

He WAS ALSO associated with the Wayne county society, American College of Physicians, Academy of Medicine and the Detroit Medical and Athletic clubs.

On June 31, 1922, he married Mary Hooley in Detroit. The couple came to Birmingham to live in 1926.

The survivors include his widow and two children, Patrick J. and Louis, at home; two sisters, Mrs. Louis Stachelski of Pinckney and Sister Benedicta Marie, O. P. of Adrian.

Burial was in Holy Sepulchre cemetery.
