Makes Solo Flight



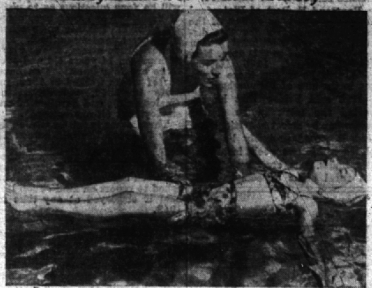

Nominee for 'Michigan Mother of Year' Visits B'ham As Weekend Guest of Son

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Yntema of Grand Rapids spent the weekend with her son Theodore Yntema and family of 783 Puritan.

Mrs. Yntema has been chosen "Grand Rapids Mother of 1950" and has been nominated for the state title. She is the mother of five sons, all of whom have received their doctorates in their chosen professions, and one daughter who has a master's degree from the University of Michigan.

Theodore Yntema, in speaking of his mother's honor, said "I feel we all owe Mother a great deal. She was a teacher before her marriage and gave every one of us an excellent intellectual background at home, in addition to what we received at school."

"THIS EXCELLENT beginning in life helped us take advantage of the other opportunities which came our way, and a great deal of credit goes to Mother for what ever successes we have enjoyed."

Yntema is vice-president in charge of finance for the Ford Motor company.

Mrs. Theodore Yntema said a survey of the children reads like six success stories.

Mrs. Yntema is proud of her nomination, of course, and she's

active in a number of affairs around Grand Rapids. She's a member of the Huguenot society, the Mayflower society, the New England Colony of the Daughters of 1612 and the Daughters of the American Revolution.

"In spite of all this and the many other things she does and has done, she claims her biggest project was raising her family. I think their careers are enough evidence to say she was very successful in her project."

MRS. YNTEMA was accompanied on her trip here by her daughter, Miss Clara Yntema, teacher of mathematics and Latin at South high school in Grand Rapids.

The 83-year-old nominee says "there was nothing special about bringing my children up. They were all intelligent children and they worked hard."

"We lived on a farm near Holland while my husband taught physics and chemistry at Hope College. There was lots to do on the farm and each had his special chores. I believe in giving youngsters responsibilities as soon as they are old enough to handle them."
