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To Prepare Maps

An appropriation of \$350 was added to Southfield township's proposed budget to hire a college planning student to prepare maps on non-conforming uses of commercial enterprises in residential areas throughout this district.

The board of review was appointed to act as a board of assessors to determine amount to be spread in Birwood subdivision in the special assessment district.

Two recommendations were approved at the meeting: Lots 19-27 in the Meadowlark garden subdivision, from residential to commercial zones; Nine Mile and Lahar corner, from commercial to residential, except where business is established, including Plum Hollow.

The board agreed to hire a consultant to meet with southern Oakland county planning council in cooperation with other communities.

A vacant house at 26335 West 12 Mile road has been condemned as unfit for occupancy. It is in a commercial zone.
