# Local Artists to Appear on Musicales Program

Mrs. I. W. Robertson, president, will preside at the Birmingham Musicales meeting to be held Thursday, April 13 at 2:00 o'clock in the Community House. A varied program of voice and piano will be presented by members of the local organization. Artists to appear include Dorothy Kemp Roosevelt, pianist, and Mary Jane Walker, soprano, who will be accompanied by Louis Elder.

Dorothy Roosevelt started the study of piano at the age of ten and the violin at the age of ten in Detroit and New York and continued the study of piano at Fontainebleau in France. Mrs. Roosevelt played concerts on both instruments in Michigan and widely traveled in recital throughout the east.

She appeared twice at the White House and in 1938 was soloist with the National Symphony under the direction of Hans Kindler. She has had three appearances with the W.P.A. orchestra under the direction of Valter Roole.

**SOPRANO SOLOIST, MARY JANE WALKER**, is a graduate of the school of music, Kansas State Teachers College. She has appeared as soloist with major oratorio societies and symphony orchestras in the middle west and was featured as soloist on tour with "The Madrigals", national concert group.

Mrs. Walker was a member of the Ford Evening Hour chorus and appeared in Detroit as well as in cities of the middle west. She was a student of Mabel Jacobs, Cameron McLean and Esther Muenstermann and received operatic and concert coaching with Cesar Giamelli, Boris Goldovsky, Frank LaForge, Theodore Harrison and Romney Fell.

Luella Elder was formerly a well known organist in Newark and South Orange, N. J. Since moving here from New Jersey she has become known in local musical circles as an accompanist, notably as appearing as a mother-daughter team with Mrs. Hohmeyer, violinist.
