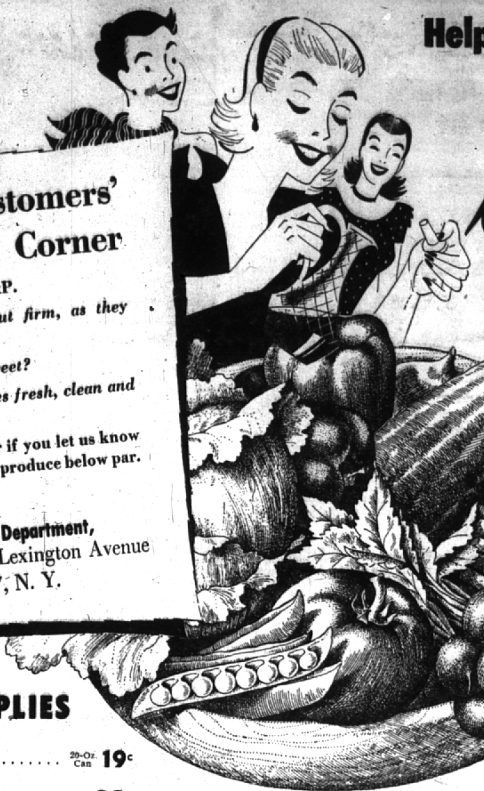

## Commissioners Defend July 24 Action That Would Decontrol Rentals Here

Two city commissioners Monday evening defended the city's action July 24 in decontrolling rental units in Birmingham.

They said steps taken by two local residents to have the federal housing expediter delay decontrolling until a "comprehensive investigation" had taken place revolved around one interpretation of "a housing shortage."

Glenn M. Emery, 311 E. Southlaws, and L. D. Gilliam, 240 E. Frank, last week requested Federal Expediter T. E. Woods to postpone certification of a city decontrol resolution until the investigation is completed and he is "satisfied the letter and spirit of the law have been complied with."

**THE TWO MEN** said the decontrol measure was, in effect, a result of the commission's disapproval of the inequities, administration and enforcement of rent controls.

The whole thing revolves around an interpretation of what is a "housing shortage?" City Commissioner Milton F. Malter stated.

"Both Emery and Gilliam went to the public hearing but they did not submit any facts for consideration," Malter said he has lived in Birmingham for many years and that all this time "there always has been more people wanting rent than there were rental units available."

**THE CITY NOW** has twice many rental units as before the last war, he said.

"I don't know how you can define a housing shortage unless you compare it with a pre-war condition," he suggested.

Commissioner Ralph A. Maddox, "We advertised the hearing and heard those who attended. That was our investigation."

City Manager Donald C. Ebert said that the area served as a factor in a conversation several months ago, admitted that "Birmingham apparently has enough rental units here now."

## Southfield Board Approves \$6,000 Attorney Fee

After a sharp exchange of words between some Southfield township board members Tuesday evening, an attorney fee of \$6,000 was approved for Daniel Shea, who handled the successful appeal to the state tax commission for a reduction in the equalized assessment rate of the township.

A detailed account of Attorney Shea of the appeal to the tax commission was read to the board before the vote was taken.

**HUGH WHITE** moved that the payment be made. He said that with the \$61,000 the township saved in tax reductions, there is still a substantial reduction after the fee is paid.

White added that the people of Southfield "would not question anyone who has gone to get a reduction in taxes for the township." He commented that the board should verify its appreciation by honoring the fee.

The only dissenting votes to the payment were by Treasurer Clara Lane and Township Clerk Mrs. Annie Adams. Mrs. Adams said she felt the fee was too high.

Before the vote, a sharp volley of words took place between Supervisor D. P. Frame and Mrs. Adams. The township clerk has maintained that the figure given by Frame to the county equalization committee was incorrect.

Frame said that Mrs. Adams was questioning the veracity of the figure given by the board. He said that the favorable verdict of the state tax commission was given by Frame to the county equalization committee that the township should have had a reduction.

After the meeting, another display of verbal fireworks took place when White demanded that all pertinent discussions of the meetings be made a point of record and placed in the minutes.

He said that the public is entitled to have complete information and all discussion is matter of public record.

**MRS. ADAMS** replied that it is unfair to ask a person to take down all discussions and still take an active part in the meeting. She suggested that the board purchase a tape recorder to be used at future meetings.

The proposal met with favorable response and it was agreed that a tape recorder would be given a trial at a future meeting to see whether it would be satisfactory.

The board will conduct a special township meeting next Monday evening at 8 in the high school to discuss prospects of securing additional township fire protection facilities.

The meeting has been called as a result of a petition signed by 75 residents.

## Wide Price Range Shown in New Home Being Built Here

Barkley G. Omans, city building inspector, reports a total of 82 permits were issued last month of these, 62 were for new buildings, including 56 single family residences. The total estimated value was \$912,000.

Price ranges on the new homes to be constructed here run from \$7,500 to \$33,000.

A break-down of the reports shows five new business places; \$182,000; six single family alterations, \$21,350; one business alteration, \$13,000; eight private garages, \$7,000 and four miscellaneous permits, \$2,100.

Total building costs for the first seven months of 1938 at \$8,175,545 as compared with \$9,092,552 for the same period last year.

## School Board Seeks Living Quarters for New Staff Members

"One of the important problems at the beginning of each school year is the placement of teachers in comfortable living quarters for the year."

**DR. IRELAND** asks persons with available rooms in their homes to register them with the board of education by Aug. 25.
