Southfield Dog Law Strongly Enforced Last Saturday

Southfield township's dog license ordinance was invoked last weekend on two residents who were served with warrants to appear in court because they had failed to purchase dog licenses and ignored subpoenas to make an appearance in court.

Farmington Justice John J. Schulte ordered Harold Murphy, 19757 Jeanette, to pay his fee plus a \$15 fine or serve five days in jail. He chose to pay the fine.

C. L. Burkholder, township dog warden, stated that Murphy was issued a warning ticket in May plus subpoenas to appear in court on June 10 and June 25. When he failed to appear either time, a warrant was issued ordering him to be in court at 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

W. Gwaltney, 19690 Jeanette, was given a choice Saturday between paying a \$7 fine plus his dog license fee or spending five days in jail. He agreed to pay the fine. Gwaltney had also ignored a warning ticket and two subpoenas.

BURKHOLDER SAID that 350 warning tickets have been issued to township residents this year concerning failure to purchase dog licenses. He added that it was necessary to serve 50 subpoenas ordering persons to appear in court. In addition, four persons have been brought into court on warrants.

The warning ticket gives the person notice that he has not purchased a dog license and gives him 10 days to secure one.

A John Bell and Howell sound projector has been ordered for the elementary school at Franklin and an Atlas grinder for the industrial arts shop at Barnum junior high school from the Glen Wing power tool firm.

The board also announced that a folding stage has been ordered for use in the new Terry school.
