Pastor To Found Lutheran Mission

The Rev. Paul Shippert has arrived in the Detroit area to serve as missionary at large for the English District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, in Beverly Hills.
A church site at the southwest corner of Clawson road and Pierce street has been acquired for the new mission which is to be served by the Rev. Shippert. A parsonage has also been obtained for the new pastor, at 1537 Bates street in Birmingham.
The son of Dr. Mary E. Shippert of Chicago, Ill., pastor Shippert received his liberal arts education at Concordia college in Milwaukee, Wis., and graduated from Concordia Theological seminary of St. Louis, Mo., in June of this year. He vicaried as teacher at Concordia college and during that time took charge of a mission for the south Wisconsin district at Okauchee.
Most of his summer field work was spent at the church of St. John the Divine in Chicago. He also helped found a mission church at Ashburn and one on the north side of Chicago. While attending the seminary, he worked at a mission during the time the church was without a pastor.

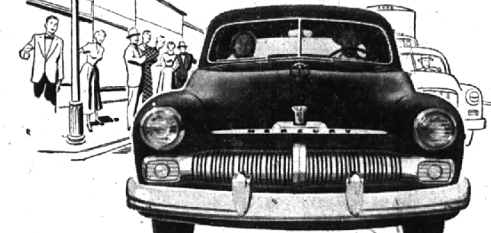

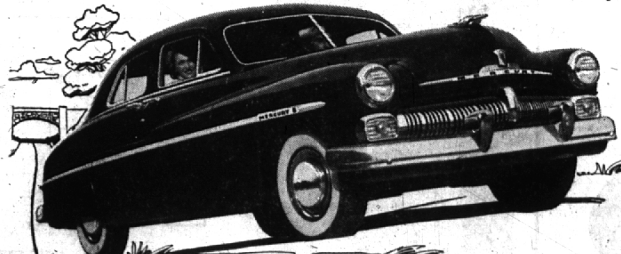
