Expert to Advise City On Proper Filing Systems

The Birmingham city filing is to undergo a rejuvenation. It was voted by commission members Monday evening to secure the services of a filing expert from Remington Rand to survey the local needs and make suggestions for the proper filing of the mass of city material.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert pointed out that there is ample space for proper filing in the municipal building but that the situation has simply out-grown present systems and that even if that, through necessity, many of the files must be kept over a period of years, and that even if current programs are a huge task.

Miss Irene Hanley, city clerk, said there were over 200 projects now under way which must be kept available for immediate study or reference.

"Many of these are things which go from this department to another and finally back to the manager's office or mine," she said. "Our present system, while good for a limited number of items, is swamped by the volume of material in it."

It was voted to allocate \$300 to be spent on a survey of the current system and for a recommendation as to how it might be corrected and made more efficient.
