Local Golf Professional May Have Made Earliest Start

 One of the nation's leading periodicals recently proclaimed for Jack Burke, Jr., that he, at the tender age of 18, had been a head golf professional at a leading country club younger in his career than any other man in the profession.

The magazine tempered the statement by adding that Burke had never heard of any other professional attaining a top position at an earlier age.

Perhaps by now he has heard of several. One local nonistation is Herman Fiebig, who has been head professional at Knollwood Country Club on West Maple for the past 17 years.

Herm is one of the best known and best liked pros in the Detroit area and his career dates back to 1917 when he became the head professional at Oakwood Country Club in Kansas City at the age of 16 years.

AS HERM PUTS IT, "I was wearing knickers both on and off the golf course."
 Herm started as a caddy of the courses around his home of Chicago's south side and, like many of the other boys in that area, golf soon seemed more important to him than school. He developed a sweet swing that is still recognized as one of the finest in these parts even though Herm has been using it for the better part of a half century. Soon he was playing the difficult layout on the South Side in part and sub figures.

Many Birmingham residents who vacation in the Harbor Springs area are acquainted with Cliff Booth, professional at the Westporting Club. It was Cliff who first recognized Herm's swing by increasing ability and offered him a job as assistant at the Oakwood Club in Kansas City, at which Booth had landed the head pro's job for the season of 1917.

WITH WORLD WAR I well underway and America just getting in the big fight, high school boys of that time were having trouble keeping their minds on reading, writing and arithmetic. Booth's offer seemed like a good excuse to eliminate further study. He was too young for service and he thought he could grow into it by working a year or two in the golf business. So, West he went fresh out of Thornton high school, equipped with only a set of hand-me-down golf clubs and plenty of ability to swing them.

At 16 years of age, young Fiebig was plenty young to be even an assistant golf pro at a fancy club several hundred miles from the scene of his first divit.

You can imagine how the lad felt when in the middle of the season, March up and joined the armed forces and the board of directors at Oakwood agreed that Herm, small of stature even for a boy of 16, would succeed to the job of head professional. He handled the position capably for the remainder of that season and all of the next.

WITH THE war over, Fiebig finally returned to the Chicago area and accepted a position at the Idlewild club. Later he switched to Olympia Fields where he became associated with Chuck Tans, one of the best known pros of his day.

Herm recalls that his job consisted of simply playing golf with the members, for which he was paid a fee for each round. It was a mighty bad day that he didn't equal or better par on each of those rounds, the record shows.

After Olympia Fields, there were jobs at Edgewater Golf Club, also in Chicago and then out-of-town to Logansport, Indiana and Columbus country club, Columbus, Ohio and the Glenway Club in Toledo.

Herm's first job in Michigan was at the Flint Country Club followed by several years when he held forth at Bedford. Seventeen years ago he took up the reins at Knollwood and serves in the capacity of greens supervisor as well as head golf professional.

HERM'S EARLIER career shows that he was an extremely good player and many of his old friends insist he could have been a consistent winner on the tourna-

ment trail had he elected to compete. He explains this by the fact that, like so many fine players of the day, he was reluctant to leave good paying club positions to gamble a bet that didn't offer the lucrative purses for which the modern-day pro competes.

Even in the low stiles were in his scope when he was a young pro and the records show that some of his early course records in the areas in which he served are still unbroken.

GOOD GOLF to Herman has always been accepted as a matter of fact. Always able to play well and master of every type of difficult shot, he shrugs off this ability to master the game.

Bowling, however, is the game in which he suffers the acute pangs of hurt and humiliation that have escaped him on the links.

He is still struggling to master the art of keeping and admits that he'll settle for anything over the 150 during the coming season, in which he will bowl in the Birmingham Sideline Quarterback's league and in the Birmingham Interchurch league.

Herm lives with his family on a quiet road just west of the fairway at Knollwood. Besides his wife, Lou, he has two sons, Herman, Jr. and Ralph.

Young Pranksters Delay Construction At Torry School
