Studying in France Under 'Kiski Plan'

Walter McPhail, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McPhail of Brookwood lane, is among the fourteen youths of the Kinkinnetas Springs school in Pennsylvania, who are taking a two-month course in French under an educational system called the "Kiski Plan."

These boys, aged sixteen to eighteen, are awakened at seven o'clock every morning at the Hotel Excelsior in Paris when they go down to breakfast and then into a study hall where they work at French for four hours.

THEY READ the Paris newspapers, the French edition of "Leaders Digest" and French literature. At noon they are given 175 francs to cover the expense of lunch anywhere they choose. In the afternoon they gather at a museum and are given 375 francs for dinner.

They return to the study hall at 9 o'clock for an hour's work before retiring and three nights a week, they stay out until 1 a.m.

THE "KISKI PLAN" was devised by the school's president, Dr. L. M. Clark, who realized that the boys learned more when they studied only one subject at a time in two-month stretches. He is in Paris to supervise the course, and says, "The boys are learning French fast but, better still, they're learning how to be a abroad."

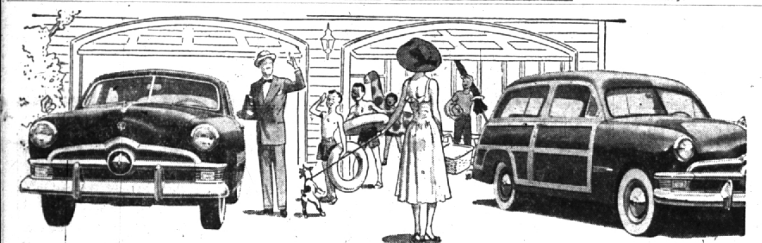

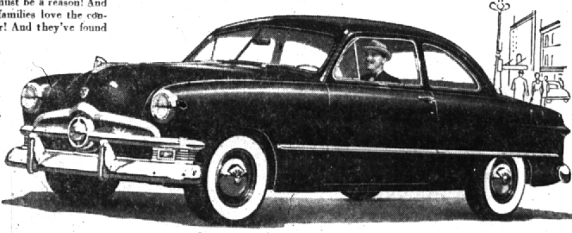

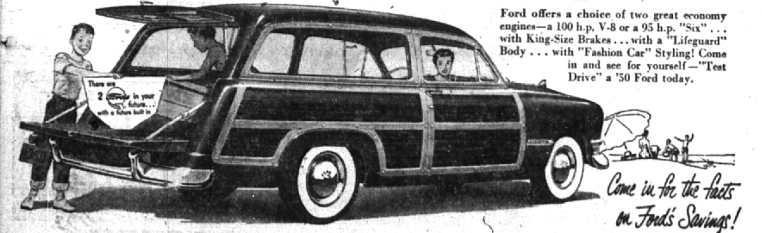
