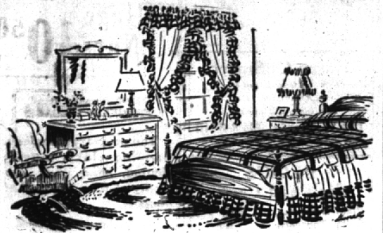
MISS DUGGER

A late October wedding is being planned by the couple.

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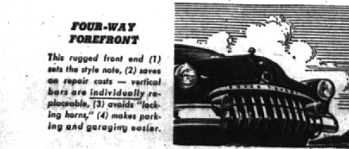
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
