

Millenium Sunday' To Feature Work of 3 Musicians

The work of three young musicians will be featured in the production of "Millenium Sunday", to be presented August 24, 25 and 26 in the Cranbrook Greek Theater.

Music for this dance drama is being composed by William Paul Malm, instructor of music composition for the dance at the University of Illinois.

MALM received his bachelors and masters degrees in music from Northwestern University where he was also a member of Pi Kappa Lambda honorary music society. In 1947 he was the pianist in residence for the Jacob's Pillow Dance festival.

During 1949 he was composer in residence at the Perry-Mansfield school of the theater. In addition he has been accompanist for Devi Dja and her Java Ball dancers and has done work for radio, movies and aquascapes.

JEROME NEFF, a young Birmingham native, will be orchestra-director for the group. He attended Baldwin high school and Cranbrook school. At present he is majoring in composition and percussion at the Eastman school of music in Rochester, N. Y.

While still in high school, Neff won first prize for two successive years in Scholastic magazine's competition for high school composers.

Chorus director for the group is Art Chatfield from Berkeley. He is a graduate student in music composition at Wayne university. All the participating chorus and orchestra personnel are local young people.
