details will report at 8:20 a.m. and be dismissed at 3.

Kindergarten pupils who attend morning classes will report at 9 a.m. and be excused at 10:30 the first week. Afternoon pupils attend from 1 to 2:30 the first week. Schedules for kindergarten youngsters will be extended one-half hour the second week and an additional half hour the third week. After that time the dismissal hours will be 1:50 a.m. and 3:25 p.m.

BUSES WILL RUN the first day and every school day thereafter according to the schedule printed elsewhere in today's Eccentric.

Cafeterias at Baldwin, Barnum and Pierce will also operate the first day of school. Lunches will be 30 cents in the junior and senior high schools and 25 cents in the elementary schools.

Although local schools will be closed for classes next week, faculty meetings will be held from Tuesday through Friday. Faculty members will report at 9 a.m., Tuesday for breakfast at Pierce school.

Ireland will introduce new faculty members and make announcements concerning school operations at a general meeting which will follow. Dr. Marion Edman of Wayne university will then address teachers on the subject, "A Comparison of Continental and American Education."

BUILDING MEETINGS will be held Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning. Dr. Virginia A. Line of Columbia university will speak on "Mental Health in the Public Schools" Wednesday afternoon at 1.

On Thursday and Friday more building meetings will take place to enable teachers to get rooms in readiness, complete plans for the first school day and formulate instructional plans for the coming year.

Parents added that pupils entering Birmingham schools for the first time should register immediately to avoid the rush of the first days of school. All principals have been in their offices since Aug. 1.

Army Stops Weapon Donation Program

Donation of military weapons to veterans, civic and other organizations for ceremonial or military trophy display purposes has been suspended for the duration of the present emergency, the department of the Army announced this week.

The Army said the reason for the program's suspension is that the time and effort of manpower required to process such donations are being used to meet increased demands brought on by the Korean situation.

Zone Change Made In 14 Mile Area

Birmingham's zoning underwent a change Thursday evening by the "charter" vote. Plan commissioners "wrapped" one section for another and came out even.

An area on 14 Mile near Woodside, has been zoned for terrace-type dwellings but is now business. A section of about 100 lots further east on 14 Mile became zoned for business rather than the terrace units.

The action was taken by members of the city planning commission who said that actually, no change was made in available areas but that the value of business properties would be increased.

The change in zoning will permit the construction of a proposed professional office building in the Sheffield estates area by Carl Reynolds, Jr.

Reynolds, in his message to the commission said the location would be far superior for the location of his type of business. The building he proposed will be of his own industrial design and will conform with city requirements.

While no immediate requests are on hand for terrace building permits, it is known that several churches, including Embury Methodist, which already has a building in the area, are planning to build in that immediate vicinity.
