

New Teachers OK'd by B of E

Approval of five teacher appointments and six resignations was given Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the Birmingham board of education.

Resignations accepted included Lucille Morton Korte, Pierce first grade; Mary McGowan; Quanton third and fourth grades; John Simmons, Baldwin high school social studies; Rosemary Carlson, Pierce first grade; Shirley Brown, Pierce second grade; and Ella Moore, Walnut Lake third grade.

Mr. Frances Carson, Quanton first grade; Robert McGee, Quanton third and fourth grades; Robert S. Richards, Baldwin high school social studies; Noia Peasley, Walnut Lake third grade and Wilma White, Pierce second grade

were the new teachers appointed. The board also approved the salary adjustment for substitute teachers, now making it \$12 per day. If a substitute teacher works more than 10 consecutive days on an assignment, payment will be \$13.50 per day.

City Asks Early Hearing Date on Court Injunction

An early hearing on the temporary injunction restraining the city from continuing with the Merrill street cutoff through Baldwin park was asked Monday by City Attorney Forbes S. Haswell.

Appearing before Circuit Judge H. Russell Holland, Haswell asked that an early hearing date be set. Haswell said the city's answer to the complaint would be filed Friday.

Baldwin Manor, Inc. and its president, Charles C. Currie, 959 Kenneway, and Ada G. Dewar and Maude D. Johnson, 679 W. Maple, have filed suit against the city to prevent use of Baldwin park for purposes other than a park.

THE MERRILL extension is one phase of the relocation of W. Maple in connection with the new 4-lane bridge over the Rouge.

Plaintiffs charge that they have vested rights in the continuance of the park, and that the original deeds to the city require it to be used as such.

SOC Water Plan Discussed Here

Approximately 25 persons attended a meeting here for cities connected with the proposed metropolitan water authority for South Oakland county. Held at the Birmingham municipal building Dec. 13, the meeting was attended by representatives from the Birmingham municipal building, Bloomfield Hills, Pontiac, Oak Park and Birmingham.

The water main would be extended from Eight mile road northward to Birmingham.

In addition, distribution mains would be located on 12, 13 and 14 mile roads and water tanks on Greenfield at 12 and 13 mile roads.

Edward E. Bissell Named to Zoning Board of Appeals

Edward E. Bissell, 1184 Edgewood, was unanimously appointed to the zoning board of appeals by a council commission Monday evening. Bissell will fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Richard Patterson who was named to the city commission last week to replace John S. O'Gorman, Jr.

"With the facts spreading their propaganda throughout the world, these toys, with notes from the children who give them, should tell other youngsters that our country is not the unpleasant place that is painted by our enemies."

"LET YOUR CHILD tell his story in his own words. He, as a child, will think of something far better about a child's life in this country than you can. He speaks the international language of childhood and will be readily understood by the boy or girl who receives the toy."
