

Dunstan Players Make Hit With Surprise Drama

An amazing plot of intrigue suddenly developed out of what had appeared to be, at its opening, a light and lovely farce last Friday evening, when the St. Dunstan players opened their current hit, Marie Valé's "The Two Mrs. Carrolls."

With all the action of the three-act play taking place in a villa on the French Riviera, the actors gradually built up to a momentum which whisked the audience through the five scenes, to a breathlessly silent finale.

LOIS CHAPMAN, cast as Clemence, opened the play with her rapid fire French lingo, and the second Mrs. Carroll, played by Dorothy Sepeby, does a beautiful job of appearing to be in love with everything about her and adeptly builds up to her dramatic climax from an opening, carefree attitude.

FRED PEW, well suited to his part of Geoffrey Carroll, the temperamental artist, provides many moments of hilarity through his blunt, wise yet lovable manner, as well as becoming the center of intrigue and hate.

Kay Brook very graciously carries through her role of the sweet but superstitious Mrs. Latham, whose daughter Cecily, played by Charlotte Adams, with the "tormented, triumphant" brings the troubled plot to a boil.

SCENE STEALER Malcolm Denny is cast as Mr. Tuttle, the very typical British professional man—absolutely complete, even to his sense of humor, formal attire and manner. Denny made his part fit like a glove and was the center of attraction, each time he lightened the stage.

Helen Miller in the role of Harriet, the first Mrs. Carroll, neatly portrayed the usually quiet but very earnest type of woman.

ALL IN ALL under way, the entire cast warmed up to the feeling of the drama and the light scenes rapidly became a tensely exploding finale.

Much credit is due everyone involved in this production, as an excellent job was done by all, considering the type of play and limited settings.

Women Voters To Hear Anne Garrison On "Politics—Theory vs. Practice"

Anne Garrison, the Democratic candidate for the Michigan State Legislature in the recent November elections, and who was defeated by Howard Estes, will present her views on politics in a talk to the League of Women Voters at the Community House on Monday, December 11 at 1:30 in the afternoon.

"Politics—Theory vs. Practice," is her subject and she will air her opinion of our present political set-up, emphasizing the role which she believes every woman in the community should play in government.

She will include some of the side-lights in campaigning from "inside politics." She will state her convictions in regard to party responsibility and her belief that only through active participation in government can women discharge their political obligations.

Mrs. Garrison's background for politics has come, to a large extent, from her activities in the League of Women Voters, in which she has been vice-president of the Michigan LWV and past president here in Birmingham.

THE RECENT ELECTION was Mrs. Garrison's first venture into the political field and her discussion will include some of the side-lights in campaigning from "inside politics."

ONE OF THE FOREMOST aims of the League is to promote citizen participation in government and the LWV Candidates Rally and Voters Service Bulletin has provided the community with valuable political information.
