Annual Scholarship Examinations Due Soon at Cranbrook

The 15th annual competition for scholarships at Cranbrook school for boys entering the ninth, tenth and eleventh grades is announced by W. Brooke Stabler, headmaster. Examinations will be held this year at 9:30 on Saturday, April 15, but all inquiries are to be in the hands of the registrar by March 31.

Prerequisites for permission to enter the competition are: recommendation from the principal of the school currently attended, good health and an indication of financial need. The scholarships average fifty per cent of the tuition which is \$1,500.00 for boarding students and \$700.00 for day students. Occasionally, where the need is larger, larger awards are made.

Cranbrook school, a day and boarding preparatory school for 300 boys has an average of one instructor for every nine students. The buildings on the 90-acre campus are the first major architectural achievement of young architects in America. Excellent opportunities are provided in arts, crafts, science, music and dramatics.

Parents or boys who are interested in this scholarship competition are invited to communicate with the registrar at Cranbrook.

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Cranbrook School to Present Driver Training Program

Cranbrook school's application for a dual-control car for use in a new driver-training course has been approved by the Automobile Club of Michigan and American automobile association. Delivery of the new Ford car will be made about Feb. 20 to Dr. W. Brooke Stabler, headmaster of Cranbrook by C. Truba, general manager of Harold Turner, Inc., Birmingham Ford dealer.

Cranbrook's car will be among the more than 250 dual-control equipped autos being delivered to Michigan high schools this year through cooperation of local educators, the AAA, Automobile Club of Michigan, car manufacturers and dealers. The auto club will furnish textbook materials for the course.

Acceptance of the course in the Cranbrook curriculum brings to 262 the total of Michigan schools offering driver-training. Ernest P. Davis, auto club safety and traffic director, said Cranbrook is thus helping Michigan lead the nation in driver-training instruction, he added.

"The small expense of the course communities adopting it will be repaid a thousand times in decreased accidents", Davis said. "Lives, auto club safety and traffic injury accidents will be cut down."

Driver-training is termed by the auto club as a "safety movement to come along since safety patrol".

The Cranbrook course will be held Saturday mornings for any enrolled student of driving age.

Carole Hall, 2647 Pembroke, a Baldwin high school student, will attend the Y-Teen conference tomorrow and Saturday at Clear Lake camp, Dowling.

The conference will be directed by two YWCA staff members from Detroit. It will deal with planning good club programs, displays, recruiting and the responsibilities of club officers. Special emphasis will be given to the fact that Y-Teens are a part of a world-wide organization in 69 countries.

Friday evening will feature square dancing and group singing in the camp lodge, with winter sports scheduled for Saturday's dawn-sessions relaxation.

At half-time, the score was 23-19 in Cranbrook's favor, but at the beginning of the second half, Cleveland decided to make a run-away of the contest and piled up a 20-point lead.

With this margin, Coach Kenney sent in his second stringers but Bill James who tried to carry on the Cranbrook comeback, took the Cleveland players task taking the half away from the Cranes. Until the second half was whittled down to a scant five points.

Then, with seconds to go, Coach Kenney sent his regulars back in to stop the Cleveland scoring.

Cranbrook's win in the team's first game was also won their match 21-14 from the University School and the Cleveland squad dropped their game 48-20.

On Tuesday, the basketball team from Hamtramck downed the Blue and Gray, 49-42. Forward Wayne Lyons led the home attack with nine baskets for 18 points, while Rufus Boers kept John McDonald and Bill James nettled in six markers apiece.
