**Home Gardeners to Have Round Table Discussion Feb. 6**

The board of directors of the Birmingham-branch of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association met at the home of Mrs. C. G. Hood on Jan. 30, for a luncheon and business meeting.

The next meeting of the Home Gardeners will be Feb. 6 at 1:00 p.m. in the Men's Lounge at the Community House. There will be a round table discussion of landscape problems and modern trends in landscape architecture.

This meeting will have a follow up in March when Mr. Roth of Glenridge Nurseries will present slides showing trees and shrubs which furnish pleasing landscape effects.

Mrs. F. H. McKinley has been elected state conservation chairman. Garden hints for February: store wood ashes from the fireplace in a covered barrel to use in the spring; spread manure over rose beds when free of snow; plant; cultivate house plants—a fork or apple core are good tops. Liquid manure once a month will increase the growth; keep foliage of house plants clean either by spraying with water or wiping with a cloth.

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
