Eastern Standard Time, February 22, 1949. Matters being heard the following matters being heard at the Southfield Township Zoning Ordinance No. 118 will be discussed:

- Change from Residence 1 zone to Commercial zone in Section 12 in said Township, described as follows:
 - Lot numbered nineteen (19) to twenty-seven (27) inclusive in Meadowlark Gardens Subdivision. (This subdivision is located in the northeast corner of Section 9B)
- Change from Residence 1 zone and Commercial zone to Industrial zone and in Section 24 in said Township, described as follows:
 - Part of Section 24, containing a point distant 88' 00" East 459.88 feet from SW corner of Lot No. 11, thence S 88' 00" East 152.75 feet, thence S 17' 15" East 808.39 feet, thence N 88' 54" West 55' 50" West 141.12 feet, thence N 8' 47' East 724.49 feet to point of beginning. This property is known as the Edna McKinlin property 21850 West Eight Mile Road.
- Change from Commercial zone to Residence 1 zone in Section 34 in said Township, described as follows:
 - Beginning at a point 100 feet E of corner Lot No. 24, Plum Hollow Gardens Subdivision, thence E 26 feet, thence S 444 feet to the N side of Mahon Avenue, thence W 259 feet along the 3' side of Mahon Avenue, thence N 284 feet along the W side of Lot No. 46 in said Subdivision, thence E 120 feet along the S side of Lot No. 28 and 37 in said Subdivision, thence N 214 feet along the W side of Lot No. 26 in said Subdivision, to point of beginning.
