The Michigan Lapidary Supply and Research Company was founded in 1947 with Worthen as president for the purpose of furthering lapidary interests and as a means of supplying improved machine equipment and materials to both commercial and amateur lapidaries.

Worthen has taught the cutting of both faceted and cabochon gem stones.
