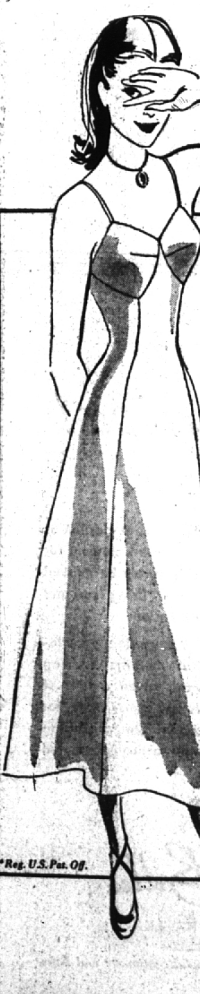
The prize for the two home rooms having the highest number of dads on hand, will be a chance to splash in the swimming pool.
