Rev. Ottipoby is a Comanche Indian whose parents followed the old tribal custom of roaming the plains. As a boy, in what is now the state of Oklahoma, he lived the life of a nomad with the rest of his band.

However, his parents became devout Christians under the leadership of missionaries of the Reformed Church. The boy had always feared white people, and even more the Indian officers who took the children to "the house of writing."

But education took on another form as missionaries explained it, and the boy like his friends eventually attended the Indian schools at Lawton and later lived with a private family in Sioux Center, Iowa.
