Agenda Discussed by Local Women Voters

The local League of Women Voters met Monday in the Community Home to discuss the proposed national agenda for 1950.

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. Graham Shinnick, president of the Birmingham chapter, Mrs. Stanley Cain, Mrs. Harry Markle and Mrs. H. B. K. Thore presented proposed resolutions. The membership then recommended that two items be forwarded to the national board for consideration.

They are: an effort to increase the effectiveness and authority of the United Nations in its promotion of peace with emphasis on fresh attempts to international disarmament, control and technical aid to under-developed countries and human rights; and exploration of the Hoover Report recommendations with a view to action and with particular emphasis on conservation programs.

In the morning, the League board members recommended for the local agenda: continued observation and education in city planning leading to action and a study of the new Oakland County survey with a view to action.

The March topic for unit discussion groups will be the federal budget.

Mrs. Shinnick has announced that plans have been completed to have Blair Moody, Washington correspondent of the Detroit News, as guest speaker at the annual luncheon of the local League on March 20.

"It is due to the United Health Fund Drive, Planned Parenthood has negotiated, and still is negotiating, for membership but, so far, has not been accepted.

"A modest investment in our campaign pays enormous dividends in human happiness, social stability, and economic savings. We must look to you for the \$5.00 which is the bare minimum needed to carry out our program in Oakland County and keep our three clinics in operation."
