The executive board of the association announced the appointment of Mrs. Willard Welch as chairman of room mothers, in the absence of Mrs. Vincent Madison. Mrs. Edna Vule is kindergarten round-up committee chairman.

It was also voted that PTA assume responsibility of selling ice cream Tuesdays and Thursdays at the school, the proceeds of which will go to the school activity fund.

Association Program

The Townsite Association has the following program for 1950: 1. Maintain property restrictions, all permits for building are examined to see they meet requirements. 2. Lathrup deed restrictions and the township zoning ordinance.

3. Contact the road commission to have roads kept in condition; to stress that work done by the commission be equalized throughout this area. 4. Representatives have called on the commission and emphasized that the growing community is not getting its share of road repairs.

5. Continue with Township office in promoting a survey of the water supply on township basis. This survey to release full information on added mains required, costs thereof, and method of assessment.

6. Continue investigation of drainage problems in order to formulate any necessary plans to correct weaknesses and provide for possible requirements needed as the juvenile population increases.

7. Continue investigation of traffic control on Southfield road to protect the children in that area. Electric counter will be set up in the near future between Nine and 14 Mile roads to determine the advisability of installing a traffic light in front of the Lathrup school. State Police are working with the association in traffic control.

8. Support youth activities such as baseball teams and Scouts' Halloween parties.

9. Publish information vital to residents here.

10. Schedule meetings which require a general consideration on community problems.

Rotarians Elect Board, Hear Story of Lakes Shipping

Six new members of the board of directors of the Birmingham Rotary club were elected at Monday's noon meeting.

They are Stuart Baker, Harry Denyes, John Hamel, Dale Millman, Ed Poole and Victor Ulrich. They will meet to elect the club's new officers which will take over club affairs July 1.

Capt. Joseph E. Johnston, director of the Museum of Great Lakes History at Belle Isle, was Monday's speaker. He described the history of shipping on the Great Lakes from the Indian's birch bark canoe to today's huge steel freighters.

"Both these types of water transportation were designed especially to meet the particular problems of shipping on the Great Lakes," he pointed out.

St. Andrews Sewer Project Confirmed

The city commission has confirmed the assessment roll for the installation of a sewer on St. Andrews from Maple north, and on Edenhorough between Maple and Yorkshire.

Private property owners will pay \$19,200 of the estimated \$1,140 project. An average 50-ft. lot will carry a \$37.24 assessment. Commissioners also set March 6 as the hearing date for confirmation of the assessment roll for 2 1/2 inch asphalt surfacing on Windemere and Manchester between Stone and St. Andrews, and on Bickingham to Manchester.

This project will require property owners to bear \$18,215 of the estimated cost of \$26,050. An average 50-ft. lot would carry a \$149.13 assessment, to be paid in three installments.

Bradshaw to Speak

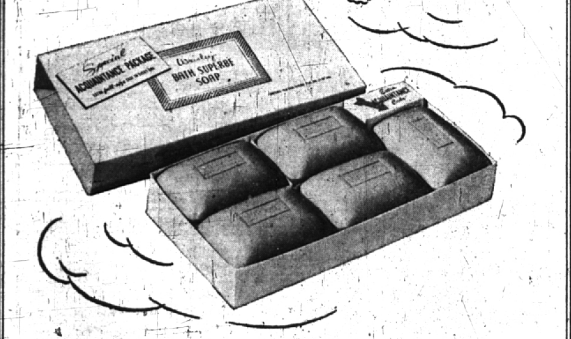
