In speaking of the current Red Cross drive, Mrs. Vandever quoted from a release sent by the national office in Washington, D. C.: "The American Red Cross is the instrument chosen by the United States government to aid in fulfilling obligations of the American people under international treaties. Congress granted a charter imposing upon the American Red Cross responsibility for conducting specific activities in behalf of the American people.

"To carry out these responsibilities entrusted under its charter, the Red Cross determines a program of services and activities and the budgetary requirements to fulfill them.

"Furthermore, in accord with resolutions adopted by the International Red Cross that appeals made in the name of the Red Cross should relate solely to objectives connected with Red Cross work and that it is contrary to this principle to join with other organizations, and that a national society should, in no circumstances, share the name or emblem of the Red Cross," it is the policy and practice of the American National Red Cross that all Red Cross fund raising appeals, including employee solicitations, be conducted only in the name of the Red Cross and separate and apart from any other fund raising efforts, and further that all fund raising campaigns be conducted only during such periods as may be determined by the board of governors of the American National Red Cross.

Continues Explanation

Mr. Vandever continued: "In accordance with this policy, in instances where any employer will permit no more than one annual, in-plant, solicitation of its employees for charitable contributions or a payroll deduction plan, the local chapter may participate in such payroll deduction plan if the following conditions are observed:

"A—Without becoming a part of or associated with any other agency or organization, the chapter will arrange directly with the employer concerned for the collection exclusively for the Red Cross of contributions or payroll deductions within the general period of the annual nation-wide Red Cross campaign.

"B—The arrangement between the employer and the chapter shall further provide that Red Cross participation in such plan is not to take the place of nor

interfere with the conduct of its annual appeal, to the community nor shall it preclude appeals by the Red Cross to meet major emergencies at times other than the period of the annual campaign.

"C—Such collections shall be remitted directly by the employer to the chapter and the employee from whom the collections are made shall be so informed.

"D—Each employee contributing a dollar or more shall receive the official Red Cross membership card."
