Possibility of Coordinated City Recreation Program to Be Studied by Group

The Community Council board, at a meeting at the Community House Monday night, approved the summarizing conclusion of the survey committee on children and youth which recently made public a six-month fact-finding study undertaken as part of a state program, and passed the matter to the Council's committee on children and youth for appropriate action.

Responsibility for instigating further study of the recreation facilities and programs of the Birmingham School District, and their continued coordination through a counseling group, now rests with the permanent committee of which Mrs. Alec Parnie is chairman.

Mrs. Parnie, a former member of the Detroit Children's Center staff, is a member of the board of the Parent-Teachers Association Council and has long been active in P.T.A. work. She was chairman of the first Family Life Institute committee. She was appointed chairman of the Council's permanent committee on children and youth last fall.

See Need for Coordination
The conclusion of the survey on services to children and youth in the Birmingham School District, which was undertaken by a committee headed by Mrs. John K. Ormond at the request of the Community Council reads:

"The outstanding problem of the community seems to be the survey committee to be that of the integration of the many existing recreation and play exercise facilities and programs into one coordinated and efficient program on the fringe of a vast industrial city."

As background for the work and guidance in coordinating a recreation program, the survey committee calls for the immediate undertaking of a study by "objective and trained people" for the purpose of discovering "what existing facilities and effort represent duplication of program; what facilities and program are lacking; what section of our youth is underserved and whether some youth groups are over-served."

Mrs. Parnie said she would take immediate steps to explore the possibilities of getting such a study made and presented for guidance of the coordinating

group which her committee will attempt to form. Former committees of Family Life Institutes and recreation program personnel, represent the nucleus of such a group, Mrs. Parnie pointed out to the Community Council board.

The Council board Monday night passed a unanimous vote of thanks to Mrs. F. G. Garrison and her committees which set up the Jan. 31 Community Council Institute which discussed "Wherein Are We Failing Our Youth?"

A general meeting of Council delegates from 41 member organizations was set for March 28. It will be a lunch meeting at the Community House and nominations will be made at that time for the new board.

Under the new by-laws of the Council, the board will consist of not less than 12 members, half of them selected for a two-year term, and half for one year.

Mrs. Ormond said that she would announce the names of members of the nominating committee within a few days.
