Congressmen Asked to Continue Efforts for Economy in Govt.

Declaring that the federal government's policy of deficit financing will seriously reduce the American standard of living and that the Hoover commission's recommendations will save the taxpayers 4 billion dollars a year, the board of directors of the Birmingham Chamber of Commerce at a meeting Monday night sent a resolution to Senators Vandenberg and Ferguson and Congressman Dondero urging them to continue to support Hoover commission suggestions and other means of reducing the cost of government.

The legislators were asked to "carefully scrutinize all appropriation bills for the purpose of reducing all federal expenditures and the number of federal employees."
