Bloomfield Village Youngster Tells of Bahama Vacation

The children at the Bloomfield Village school received a letter last week from Linda Mathews, in the Bahamas. She is vacationing with her parents, Dr. and Mrs. Albert L. Mathews, in the Bahamas. They are staying at Governor's Harbor, Eleuthera.

Linda writes that she is having a wonderful time and seeing many strange sights for a little girl from the second grade. She told her classmates that Eleuthera is a small island, with the Atlantic ocean on one side and the Caribbean sea on the other. The island is only three-quarters of a mile wide where the Mathews are staying.

Linda reported that there are only a few cars on the island, and that they are all very small. There are no telephones and no electricity at all. Linda amuses herself by walking along the beach looking for sea shells and starfish.

She goes on to tell her little friends that there are only 50 white people in the area, and about 400 colored. The native Arw-aw Indians were taken to Haiti soon after Columbus landed on Eleuthera, and made to work in the mines where most of them died. The island was uninhabited from 1501 to 1648, when settlers came from England and Bermuda.

Linda says, "When slavery was ended there was no one to do the hard work on the plantations and most of them failed."

Means 'Freedom'

"The name 'Eleuthera' means 'freedom' and today the island is free of nearly everything, including people."

She said the island grows coconuts, pineapples, tomatoes and oranges. As she was writing the letter she watched a man climb one of the many palm trees to cut coconuts.

"He uses a big knife called a 'machete,'" Linda told her classmates.

While there, Linda has also visited a ranch where she saw 80-100 chickens and 600 dairy cattle. She was planning to send a picture which her daddy had taken of her, sitting under a palm tree.

Linda admitted that her daddy had helped with the letter, but added that she was keeping up with her studies as much as possible.

Pontiac Swimmers Beaten; Several Records Shattered

Showing great improvement the local tankmen upset a favored Pontiac team 51-33 at Farnum pool Tuesday afternoon in a fast meet in which three new pool and two school records were established.

In defeating the Chiefs the Maples accomplished a tremendous feat in an early season meet, the locals were beaten by the Pontiac swimmers 45-39 in the latter's record of 1:08.8.

Friday the Maples took seven out of nine possible frats with only Jay Myers switching entries to the advantage of the locals. Dick Helgeson was switched from the 100 to the 50 yard freestyle, which he won, leaving Mark Joslyn in the 100 to nose out Chief Brooks' record of 1:29.5.

Maple Larry Miller again showed his heels to opponents, finishing in an early season meet, a new pool and school record of 1:07.4, breaking his previous record of 1:08.8. Chief's captain, Ron Ridgway, and Maple Dick Dean raced neck and neck in the 60 yard breast stroke. Ridgway edged Dean out in record time of 1:07.8, breaking the old record of 1:08.2 set by Ypsilanti's Bill Warrington.

Near State Time

The team of Miller, Dean and Helgeson splashed to a new pool and school record of 1:26.0, cutting .32 of the old pool record of 1:29.5 set by last year's team of Bob Webster, Dean and Jack Adams. They came within a half second of the state record time, 1:25.5.

Maple Frank Weaver took first place in diving again, best competition from Pontiac's Bill Cagle. Garry Osterbeck, Birmingham sophomore, copped third place.

The race of the meet was the 200 yard free style relay with anchorman Neil Stoll coming from behind to nose out Pontiac's Daniel Voydout in a fitting climax of a good meet.

Frank Weaver was chosen captain of the meet.
