

Localities Will Appear on Panel Discussion Feb. 20

Oakland branch of the AAUW will sponsor a panel discussion on world government which will be open to the public at 8:00 p.m. Monday, Feb. 20 in the Ridgedale Playhouse, 8501 West Ten Mile road, in Pleasant Ridge.

"World Government—Why? When? How?" will be debated by a panel consisting of Mrs. Charles J. Shain, who will serve as moderator; Russell Barnes, Detroit News foreign affairs columnist; Mrs. Stuart Fraser, representing the United World Federalists; and Dr. John Ormond of the Federal Union.

Mrs. Shain, a University of Michigan graduate, has contributed generously of her time to Birmingham community activities. Shortly after the first World War she was instrumental in organizing a branch of the AAUW here, serving as its first president for four years. Her weekly class in international relations is now in its 30th consecutive year with over 700 women having attended.

Mrs. Shain was instrumental in forming the Women's International Education Council in Detroit

and in 1925 helped to found a men and women's discussion group which later became the Detroit branch of the Foreign Policy Association for which she served as president the past three years.

Life Membership
Twice Mrs. Shain was a national delegate to the International Association of University Women meetings in Paris in 1922 and Toronto in 1947 and plans to be at Geneva this year. She was elected to the Academy of Social and Political Sciences and to life membership in the National Geographic Association and the Birmingham Women's Club.

Russell Barnes has been on the News staff for the past 30 years and served both as European and Washington correspondent during World War II. He was with the Office of War Information for three years in Cuba and later was sent to Algiers to become director of the psychological warfare branch of the staff section of Allied Forces Headquarters in the Mediterranean area. For this work Barnes was awarded the War Department's Exceptional Civilian Service Emblem, the first civilian service award in OWI to receive this distinction.

Coffee and refreshments will be served following the panel so that guests and panel members may continue an informal discussion. There is no admission charge.

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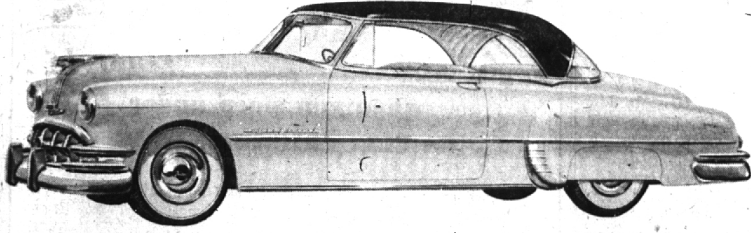

Save the Children Federation Plans Benefit Party on Feb. 24

Investigators' reports revealing the current plight of children in Greece are responsible for new efforts by the Save the Children Federation. The organization has announced a benefit entertainment at the home of Mrs. F. G. Garrison, 3970 West Maple, Friday night, Feb. 24. A feature of the evening will be the presentation of Detroit Nils Ingvaldsen's most recent travel movies, with Ingvaldsen present as narrator.

Until recently, most of the efforts of the Birmingham chapter of the Save the Children Federation were directed toward the children of western Europe. Members contributed clothing for children and prepared infants' layettes for numerous shipments overseas.

The Birmingham chapter has led many larger communities in size and regularity of its contributions. But in the past few weeks, observers entering Greece and noting the results of the long civil war, have reported urgent need for help for the children of that country, whose plight is now worse than that of any European youngsters. Most recent report is

that of Dr. Charles R. Joy, Save the Children overseas commissioner, who called his New York office after his return from a survey of districts between Mt. Olympus and Mt. Parnassus.

Dr. Joy reported most children sleeping on the ground, wrapped in rags, and living in makeshift huts. One out of four are tubercular, according to his report, which emphasized the special plight of babies for whom there is no clothing of any kind.

As a result of this report, proceeds of the Feb. 24 affair at the Garrison home will be used chiefly for materials for infants' layettes.

Mrs. Rudolf Esch, president of the Birmingham chapter of the group, has appointed a committee headed by Mrs. Frederic W. Sevin to handle details of the benefit.
