

Average weekly earnings of factory employees have risen from \$11 in 1915 to over \$61 in 1948. In terms of buying power, the average factory worker can buy twice as much as he could 35 years ago.

The per capita cost of running the Federal government tripled between 1800 and 1900, from \$2.03 to \$6.85. From 1900 to date it has multiplied 10 times, and now costs \$471.15 for each person in the nation.

**Lathrup Man Pens History of Masonry in Oakland County**

Members of Masonic lodges in this area will be particularly interested in a new history of Freemasonry in Oakland County, Michigan, a book recently written by Charles Fey of Lansing.

Fey, a resident of this area for the past nine years, has been a Mason since 1923, and as a past master of Royal Oak Lodge, 464. His professional time is taken up as an office manager for the Chicago Pneumatic Tool company.

His current books, which list some 2,000 names which have been prominent in Oakland County's Masonic history, was written in spare time, taking from 10 to 12 years to compile. During this time he has also written 25 separate articles and contributed to other literary works on Masonry.

The history of Oakland County contains more than 300 pages and was departmented by Fey. He prepared and edited his own copy, set his own stenists and ran the 100 copies off on a mimeograph machine.

"Carefully Documented"

"The Masonic World", in speaking of Fey's work says: "It is a complete history of Freemasonry in Oakland County and is presented carefully documented and authentic to the last detail."

"It is the story of men doing things for the world and a single item is lacking to make an ideal best seller. Completely adorned with sugar coating, it, nevertheless, presents in authentic detail an entrancing story of Freemasonry at work."

The publication describes Fey as "an experienced historian, who steadfastly refuses to present anything but the actual facts involved."

A member of the history committee of both Grand Lodge, F.A.M. of Michigan and the Grand Chapter, R.A.M. of Michigan, he is also a member of the board of control of the Michigan Masonic Home."

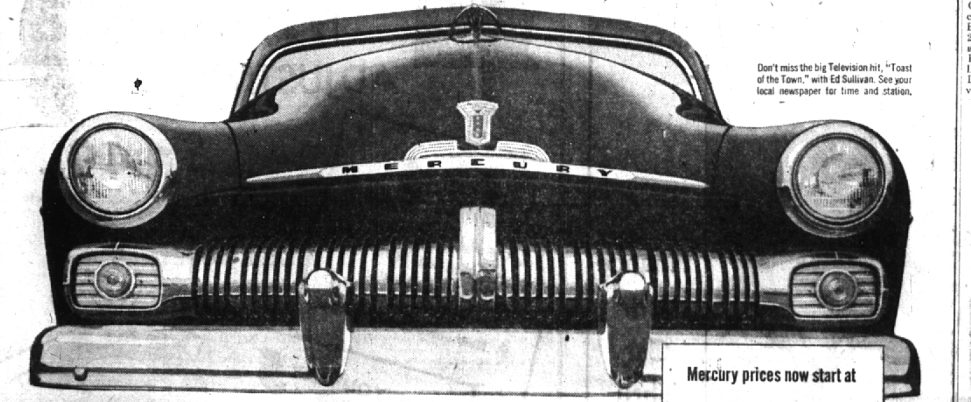
